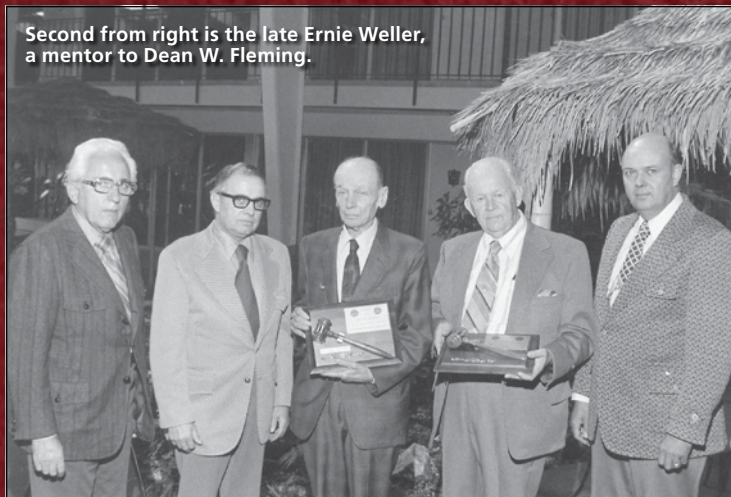

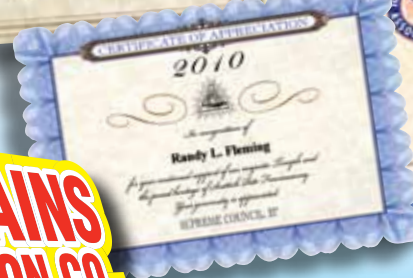

Roger Fleming

Roger Fleming was born and reared on a livestock farm in Iowa. He graduated from Iowa State College in 1938 with a degree in agricultural economics. Mr. Fleming worked briefly for the Cooperative Extension Service prior to commencing work as head of the research department of the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation in 1938. Prior to volunteering for service in the U.S. Navy in 1943, he directed the Iowa Farm Bureau's legislative activities for four years. He was commissioned an officer in the

Supply Corps and served two and one-half years, 18 months of which were aboard a Destroyer Escort in the Pacific. While in the service, he was selected as Secretary of the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation. After his return to civilian responsibilities in 1946, he served in that position until 1948 when he became head of the Washington, D.C., office of the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF). In 1949, Mr. Fleming was given the added responsibilities of AFBF secretary-treasurer. He served in that capacity until January, 1976, a period of 25 years. His name first appeared in "Who's Who in America" in the 1954-1955 edition, when he was 39. He began his duties as Executive Vice President and General Manager of the Farm Family Insurance Companies in February, 1976. Mr. Fleming and his wife, Jeanne, have a married daughter.



Craig A. Fleming PRESIDENT

Craig A. Fleming, a published author has been the CEO/President of 9 separate companies over his 40 year career and currently is the CEO/President of ServiceQuest Inc. he is formally Chairman/CEO and President of Media Arts Group, Inc., beginning in 1996, and responsible for building the largest art-based publishing company in the world around Artist Thomas Kinkade. Media Arts Group was the first such company to ever be listed on the New York Stock Exchange. From 1996 through 2001 the

Company revenues grew from \$47m to \$350m, while the retail presence of Thomas Kinkade grew from 900 to 5,000 retail locations worldwide, with just over 800 employees under Mr. Fleming's leadership. During those five years, the brand name of Thomas Kinkade became the most recognized living artist in the world. Craig and his wife Kelly reside in Orlando, Florida. Craig attended Doane University in Crete, Nebraska. Dawn Fleming, the oldest daughter, graduated from Rollins College in Orlando with her MBA in Business in 2010. Erin Fleming, attended the University of Florida in Gainesville where she was the starting libero for the nationally ranked Florida Gators volleyball team. Son Evan currently resides in Los Angeles, California and is involved in software implementation for the retail industry.

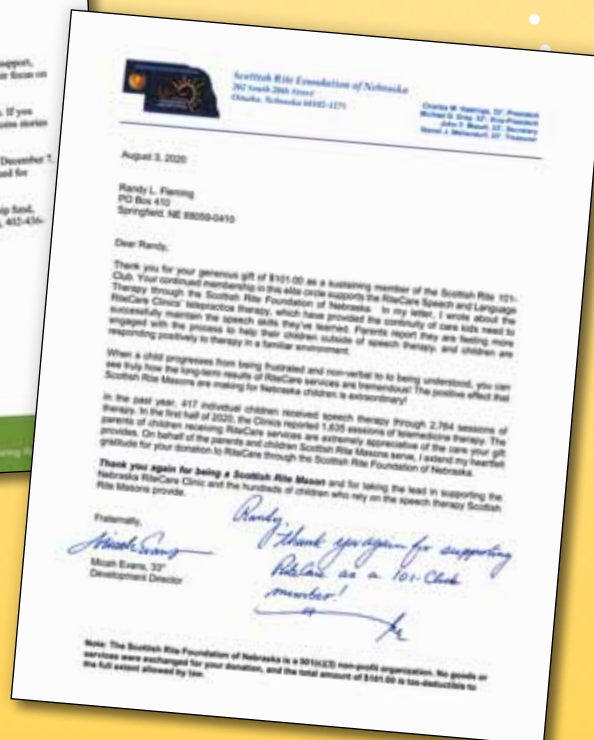

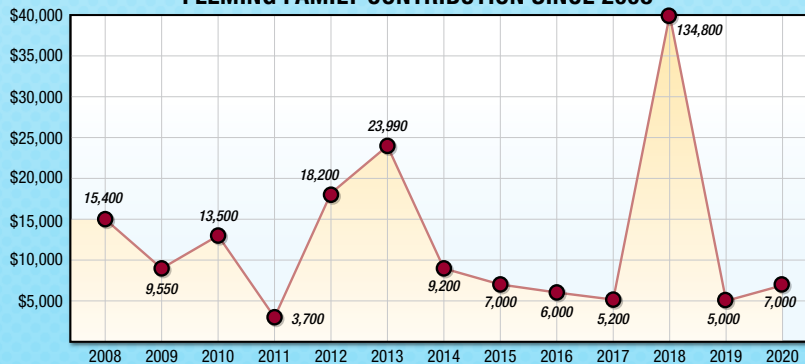
Dear Scholarship donor

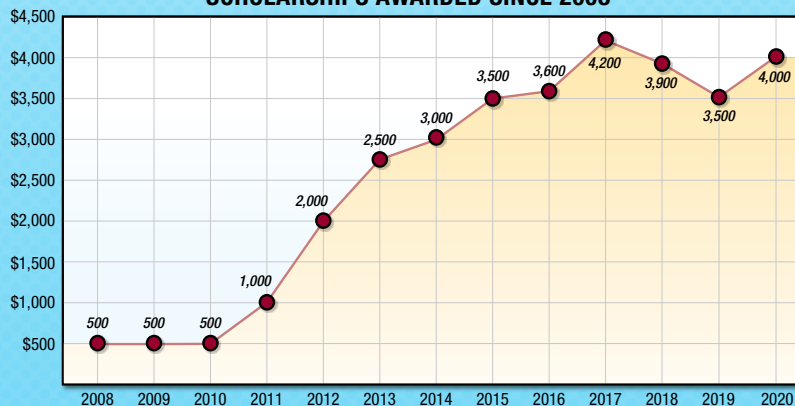

FLEMING FAMILY FOUNDATION RECEIVES LARGEST DONATION

There were 10 eastern Nebraska organizations that divided nearly \$900,000 in estate funds from Lincoln native Joe Meehan during a luncheon at the Scottish Rite Masonic Center in downtown Lincoln.

The 92-year-old Meehan, who died in February 2018, spent nearly three years in the U.S. Army during the 1940s. He founded the WWII Library and Museum near Greenwood. Meehan was a 60-year member of the Masons. He was a master mason at North Star Lodge No. 227 and traveled to numerous Shrine conventions throughout the country.

Meehan's 891,811.55 estate funds were divided among the following organizations:

\$127,401.65 - Fleming Family Foundation in Springfield; Foundation for Lincoln Public Schools; Lincoln Scottish Rite Preservation Foundation; Masonic-Eastern Star home for Children in Fremont; North Star Lodge No. 227 in Lincoln; Sesostri Shrine Transportation Fund of Roca.

\$38,220.50 - American Legion Post No. 294 in Hallam; Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary from Lincoln; Veterans of Foreign Wars in Lincoln.

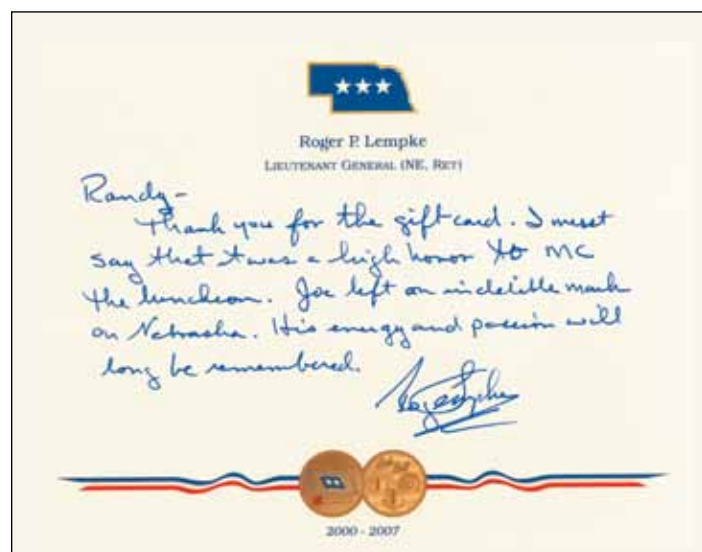
\$12,740.15 - Disabled American Veterans from Lincoln.

Joe lived with his grandparents where he did chores, milked goats, and attended Huntington Grade School and Jackson High School, and graduated in the 9th grade. He went to North East a short time and had a job setting pins at Lincoln Bowling Alley making \$3.00 a week. Joe started a school garden in 1936 and has had a garden until this day. He went to work at the Lincoln Dairy for Jake and Harry Breslow where he drove his dad's 1932 Chevy, then his 1937 Mack pickup truck. He bought a 1927 Chevy for \$175.00 and sold the tires for \$125.00. He also raised chickens and hogs until he was 18 in 1943.

That November he was drafted into the Army at Fort Crook Omaha;

then went to Fort Leavenworth; then to Aberdeen Proving Grounds Maryland for basic; then to Co K Automotive School in Aberdeen; then to Camp Pickett VA for six weeks for combat training with a stopover at RP Hill. Then back to Aberdeen; then home for 14 days; then to Camp Beale California; then to Fort Lawton, WA. Later, he was sent to 13th Replacement Dept., then to Fort Kam; then to Black Point. February 29, 1946, Joe was on his way home, then off to Camp Stoneman, California. Ending in Fort Logan, CO, after being discharged March 13, 1946.

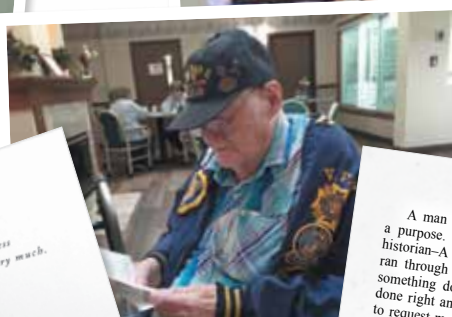
Joe returned home on March 26, 1946, and joined the VFW 1450 and the American Legion. He went overseas on the USS *Grant* and came home on the USS *Talladega* APA 208.

Later, he went to work at Cushman Motor Works. Soon after they went on strike. Joe quit and went on 52-20 Club. He went back to Cushman for almost a year, selling used cars and motorcycles until 1970. He owned a motorcycle shop and sold new German motorcycles.

He then went to work at Army Reserve on N. 33rd Street. In between he also bought properties, owning over eight houses and fifty-two pieces of property in 1951. He went to work at the Post Office in 1955 until March 4th, 1975, where he was put on disability, and started the WWII Library and Museum in 1978. He did over 250 WWII programs for over two million people in over 250 newspapers over 30 times on TV interviews all over 50 states and 52 foreign countries. Ten years in seven different theatres all over the country.

A man among men, a man with a mission. An American patriot. A man with a purpose. A man always moving beyond status quo. A visionary-deep thinker—ran through his blood and soul for our Freedom, Red, white, and blue—something done he not only meant it, he had expectations that you would get it done right and just like he told you. He would send me on mission trips to the VA to request medals he thought he had earned but never received. We even made trips to Senator Deb Fischer's office to talk to General Roger Lempe to help assist us in his mission.

Joe said some people thought he was cheap but he told me he was just thrifty! Joe realized a lot of success in his life and over the past couple years he has been returning that success in form of scholarships to young men and women. Joe received great joy and pleasure in handing those students their checks and then sharing his life stories with them. There has been other 501 (C) organizations, some who are here today that Joe has shared his success with over the last couple of years as well.

Joe loved people, but even more than his love for people, he loved Rose for thirty years. Rose, on occasion, had to put her foot down and when she did Joe knew that he needed to walk that line a little tighter. Joe, being Irishman, wasn't afraid of celebrating with a libation or two, but always in moderation.

He was a proud Mason and Shriner. He and Rose traveled all over the United States attending Shriner conventions and his real accomplishment was when he could get young children help at Shriner hospitals. He helped more than one child get the free medical care they needed through the Shriners.

Joe was always humble, and the professional and caring staff at Holmes Lake all appreciated and loved Joe. I know I really appreciated their love and compassion. I would visit Joe weekly in the nursing home and it wasn't just 10 or 15 minutes, it was always three to five hours. I always blocked out half a day when I visited him as we always had plenty to do and discuss and we always had time for lunch or dinner. At the end he had one last request for me to handle and when the mission was accomplished he shook my hand five times and said we got everything done he wanted done.

I want to thank CHI Hospice - Krishell Steele RN and Robin who saw Joe on a regular basis for seven months. A special thanks to Peg Wilson, Shelly Needham, Rayla Thompson, and Inez Moyer for their countless hours they spent around the clock giving Joe love and compassion as he began his journey to Heaven.

Joe, rest in peace my brother, your spirit will live forever in many people's hearts and souls.
